All dimensions are approximate and are in centimetres (2.54cm to the inch for those who can't remember).

Comments on the condition of the items are subjective, so close viewing of the lots on the night is therefore strongly recommended. XX in the right hand margin indicates good or very good condition; X some marking/poorish condition; blank indicates very poor condition; o unseen.

PURCHASE OF LOTS

To reduce the need for items to be paid for individually, we propose to keep a record of each purchase so that all lots bought can be collected and paid for at any time during the evening. In order for this to operate smoothly we would ask all bidders to register for a bidder's number and to show that after a successful bid.
